

OUR IMPACT IN 2020

We leverage our high-performance building with its coworking and event space to accelerate sustainable solutions. The Alliance Center's programs mobilize our tenants, partners and supporters to combat climate change in an equitable way. We measure our impact through the United Nations' **Sustainable Development Goals** (SDGs). Here are some of the ways The Alliance Center directly advanced six of them in 2020:



CLOSER LOOK



The Alliance Center has spent the last three years intentionally working on diversity, equity, equality and inclusion (DEEI) as an organization. We started with a deep dive into our culture, policies and hiring. We found that even with the best of efforts, our applicant pool did not properly represent the diverse backgrounds and communities of Colorado that we support. In response to this, we launched the the Sustainability Skills Initiative (SSI).

SSI builds skills, empowers future leaders and diversifies the pipeline of employment in the sustainability movement. In the initiative's first year, our seven participants directly contributed to The Alliance Center's programs and received career building skills, training and networking opportunities. Each of the participants are now exploring careers in sustainability and represent communities that have traditionally been left out of the environmental movement. Maria Reyes, one of our program interns, had the following to say about her experience with SSI in 2020:

"My summer internship at The Alliance Center has given me the opportunity to see so much more about the sustainability field than I am able to learn in a classroom. Being a part of the Colorado Emergence Series opened my eyes to how we can only effectively address our most

pressing environmental and social justice needs through collaboration. Not only have I been able to expand my skill sets, but I have also strengthened the skills I possessed coming into this position..."

In 2021, we look forward to growing this initiative with more participants and partners, additional training and broader impact.

CLOSER LOOK



When the pandemic hit, most leaders and institutions rightly focused on crisis management. The government dealt with the immediate task at hand while COVID disrupted the very systems that govern our lives. While Colorado's government was in active response mode in 2020, we focused on long-term recovery by listening to hundreds of people, from ranchers to small business owners and concerned citizens to CEOs, about the future they want. This elicited over 1,000 ideas to build Colorado forward from the pandemic. These solutions offer a roadmap for a regenerative recovery that builds a resilient localized economy, abundantly meets human needs and equitably provides clean air, water, food and energy.

To actualize this work, we built the Regenerative Recovery Coalition. Now with almost 300 citizens, experts, nonprofits, communities and businesses, the Coalition members will work together to prioritize equity and sustainability as Colorado recovers from the effects of the pandemic. The organizations in the Coalition represent more than 21,000 jobs in the state and more than \$2.8 billion in annual revenue. Our members believe in a regenerative recovery and are hard at work to make it a reality. The Coalition is organized into working groups to shape and implement the new economic system. These will enable Colorado to:

- Transition rapidly to renewable, distributive, reliable energy
- Strengthen and increase Colorado's regenerative food system
- Provide equitable access and opportunities for all
- Build the industries and workforce of the future
- Invest in natural and built infrastructure
- Build Colorado's circular economy
- Preserve and strengthen democratic institutions
- Leverage diverse partnerships to demonstrate regeneration in action

Colorado will get a one-time infusion of stimulus funds. We are working to ensure that they are put to work accelerating a regenerative recovery, not sliding back to the broken "normal."



CLOSER LOOK



At The Alliance Center, we have always leveraged our building as a living lab for environmental efficiency. As the immediate response to the COVID pandemic began to subside in 2020, we focused on how to provide our community the assurance needed to return to the building through the WELL Health-Safety Rating by the International WELL Building Institute. The rating requires third party verification on topics such as reducing surface contact, planning for healthy re-entry, monitoring air quality and more. We are proud to say that we have received this rating and are one of the first to do so in the state of Colorado.

We also laid the foundation to install the first bidirectional electric vehicle charging station in Denver and the first installation in North America that includes a publicly available carshare vehicle. Our bidirectional charging station will charge a dedicated Nissan LEAF from the building while also allowing the building to use the electric vehicle's battery for its power needs. This project, made possible through our ongoing work with Fermata Energy, Colorado

CarShare, Colorado Smart Cities Alliance and Xcel Energy, demonstrates a business model that benefits buildings, grids, carsharing, transit electrification and the environment alike.

This year we will continue our progress through new research efforts focused on air quality in our building. As the most energy efficient building in Lower Downtown Denver, The Alliance Center continues to push the limits in sustainability, which would not be possible without our community's ongoing support. Together, we're utilizing innovation as a valuable tool in the fight against climate change.




YOUR IMPACT


